BECKS: FAN CAME IN TO SAY 'HELLO'

DAVID Beckham has spoken about the moment a disgruntled England fan burst into the team's dressing room minutes after Princes William and Harry had left.

The irate supporter had just watched England's 0-0 bore draw with Algeria which saw the team booed off by their own fans.

Manchester United star Wayne Rooney blasted the boo boys to a TV cameraman as he walked off the pitch, complaining: "Nice to see your home fans booing you."

Beckham refused to reveal what the man said but stressed it was not a comment on the team's performance against Algeria in Cape Town.

The footballer played down the security lapse that has sparked a major security review at the tournament in South Africa.

He said it had been "blown out of all proportion", even though the English Football Association (FA) made an official complaint about the incident.

The England midfielder's comments came during an FA reception in Johannesburg attended by William and Harry.

Beckham, who gave a joint interview with the royals, said about the incident: "The fan literally just walked in very casually and just said something to me and then walked out - there was no scuffle, there was no aggression at all."

Asked what was said, Harry interjected, laughing: "A personal conversation," and Beckham agreed: "It was a very personal conversation."

The soccer star added: "He didn't comment on the performance, he literally walked in, said hello."

Again one of the princes interrupted the footballer, with William joking the incident was all down to them. "Harry and I left the door open, that's why it happened, it was our fault."

The Football Association formally complained to FIFA and will demand security is tightened after last night's security lapse at Cape Town's Green Point Stadium.

Fabio Capello's men must now beat group leaders Slovenia in the final game of the group stage to guarantee their progress in the competition.
