

# STAR CLOSES HIS SEX-FILES

THE X-FILES star David Duchovny and his estranged wife Tea Leoni are back together, eight months after he sought treatment for sex addiction.

Duchovny (48) and The Family Man star Leoni (43) were spotted taking their children, Madelaine (10) and Kyd (7) to the Broadway revival of the musical Hair.

They were both wearing their wedding rings. "Tea and David were beaming throughout the show and definitely seemed thrilled to be back together," a witness told the New York Daily News.

"They're one big happy family again."

The couple, who married in 1997, confirmed their split last October, saying they had been separated for several months.

## Rehab

When Duchovny, who plays a sex-obsessed writer in the television series Californication, went into rehab, it was reported that Leoni had threatened to divorce him if he did not seek treatment.

Their sighting in New York follows reports they holidayed together in Mustique in March.

Leoni was last seen in the Ricky Gervais film Ghost

IN THE DAYS before the tragedy that wiped out their family, Adrian and Ciara Dunne behaved like teenagers in love.

They exchanged sexually explicit text messages with each other even though they were both at home.

But it is a series of other sinister texts that Adrian's family believe may have driven him to strangle Ciara and their two girls Leane and Shania before killing himself in their Monageer home.

While a report branded as a whitewash this week laid the blame for the horror with deranged dad Adrian, his mother told the Sunday World last February that he was living in fear of loan sharks.

This week the report in the Dunne family tragedy at Monageer confirmed the family had spiralling debts which may have fuelled the tragic events.

The Dunes owed a total of €34,400 to a range of banks, credit unions and individuals at the time Adrian decided to wipe out his family in their Co. Wexford home.

## Loans

This included €1,669 owed to a family friend from Limerick. The money had been withdrawn from her bank account without her permission after she had given Adrian Dunne her Laser card details to pay off his Sky TV bill.

The report briefly mentions alleged harassment by loan sharks. A heavily edited statement made by an anonymous garda during the inquiry tallies with an interview Adrian Dunne's mother gave to the Sunday World in February 2008.

The report says Adrian and Ciara Dunne made a formal complaint of receiving threatening phone calls to his mobile phone and were "intimidated" by a caller to the house regarding bad debts.

"The garda was shown text messages on Adrian Dunne's mobile phone...[and] investigated the formal complaint relating to the receipt of threatening calls. The phone num-

ber of the threatening caller was unknown and never fully established."

When asked why the text messages at least were not traced, Minister Barry Andrews said the panel of experts who carried out the inquiry had "not established a link" between the phone messages and the murder-suicide.

However, the threats were taken very seriously by Mary Dunne as she struggled to find a reason for her son's actions.

In a Sunday World interview in February 2008, Mary Dunne said Adrian had told her he and Ciara were living in fear of moneylenders.

"They had threatened to kill him and Ciara. They had threatened to rape the children and kill them all."

She said Adrian had told her the loan sharks "were after the two of them and they were following her around in the car".

He then asked his mother for €50,000. "I told him I didn't have that kind of money," she told the Sunday World.

Mrs Dunne was afraid to name the money-

lenders and claimed she did not know their names, adding: "I don't want to bring them on me and the family. They're too dangerous to have anything to do with."

The inquiry report confirms that Adrian felt he and the family were being bullied by neighbours. It cites a few reports of minor incidents to gardai - a garden hose was shoved through the letterbox and eggs were thrown at the house.

## Serious

Mrs Dunne told the Sunday World the "bullying" was more serious.

"Ciara was afraid to go for a walk with the children because people were jeering them and throwing stones at the children. People were saying 'Here's the three blind mice' in reference to a genetic disability they suffered from. So Adrian wouldn't let the children out to play."
